

To teach, from a biblical perspective, about the blessing of tithing, what it consists of, and how to become a good holistic steward.

REAL LIFE STORY

Someone once said that there are Christians who were baptized but who did not allow their wallets to be baptized, since they are not willing to give of their finances for the advancement of the Kingdom of God, they always have an excuse, when someone wants to teach them about the issue of finances and the Kingdom of God turn a deaf ear or become offended.

We must recognize that the subject of tithes is one that stirs up disputes. Until a few years ago tithe was seen as a duty and this way of conceiving it was helped by the way the subject was taught; "God asks you to tithe, 90% is yours, but that 10% belongs to God." Generally, this teaching was based on the indications of the books of Leviticus, Deuteronomy, or the book of the prophet Malachi, but why would we give the tithe?

There is a rule that helps us interpret the Bible, it is the rule of the first mention, when we apply this rule to the subject of tithe, we get a great surprise. The first time the subject of tithing appears in the Bible is in the book of Genesis. Studying this passage and how the practice of tithing started broke the popular myth that "tithing is from the law of Moses." Another myth that was broken was that "10% is God's and the other 90% is yours", since the testimony that we find in the Bible is that everything, including 10%, 90%, and ourselves, belong to God.

WHAT DOES THE SCRIPTURE SAY?

Read Genesis 14:17-24.

Verses 1 through 16 tell us that there was a war between 9 kings, 4 against 5 of them. One of those kings was the king of Sodom, a land where Lot, Abram's nephew, had come to live as a negative result of the war. Lot was taken captive by the victorious kings, so Abram, hearing the news, went to the rescue of his nephew, faced the armies that had triumphed in war and defeated them, freeing Lot, and his family, bringing along with them the spoils of victory. On his return, Abram meets Melchizedek (king of Salem and priest of the Highest God) and gives him tithes of the spoils of war. This is the first mention of the subject of tithes, we should note some things that are key:

- a) The tithe is not a matter of law, it is in fact a practice prior to the law of Moses.
- b) The tithe is a token of gratitude for the blessings received, in Abram's case it was the victory in this war that was uneven.
- c) The tithe is offered to God but given to the one who represents Him on earth, in the case of Abram he gave it to Melchizedek.

Read Genesis 28:10-22.

Now we have Abram's grandson; Jacob, whose name means trickster or usurper, since he stole the blessing of his brother Esau from him, who had sold his blessing for a bowl of lentils. Now Jacob is on his way to visit his mother's family, but is forced to pause as night has come, he sleeps in a place called "light", which he later called "Beth-el", there he had a dream in which God Himself revealed to him and gave him a promise, to give him a great progeny, the land in which he was and that would extend to the four cardinal points of the earth, God would accompany him until the promise had been fulfilled. Upon awakening he recognized that this place was special and made a pact with God; "If God will be with me and will watch over me on this journey I am taking and will give me food to eat and clothes to wear so that I return safely to my father's household, then the Lord will be my God and this stone that I have set up as a pillar will be God's house, and of all that you give me I will give you a tenth."

Once again, we note that tithing is not a matter of the law, it is a matter of the heart. Jacob had received God's promise and tells Him; "Lord, if You bless me, I will respond in gratitude, and of all that you give me I will give you a tenth."

As we have seen, tithing is not a matter of law, even though we can go to the book of Leviticus or Deuteronomy and find instructions on the subject.

"On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with your income, saving it up, so that when I come no collections will have to be made."

- 1 Corinthians 16:2

WHAT IS THE TITHE?

The tithe is a matter of the heart. When we tithe, we are manifesting a thankful heart, a spirit of faith, and an attitude of obedience.

- a) A grateful heart for all that God has given us. We take a tenth of what we have received from Him to say thank you.
- b) A spirit of faith. Our logic tells us that with 100% of what we received we can live better than with 90%, but the reality is that with 90%, in God's blessing, we will live more fully.
- c) An attitude of obedience. The tithe is a matter of the heart, but we cannot ignore what God has said; "On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with your income, saving it up, so that when I come no collections will have to be made." I Corinthians 16:2.

When we set aside the tithe and another portion for the offerings, we are being obedient to the ordinance of our God.





BIBLICAL SUPPORT

"I the Lord do not change. So you, the descendants of Jacob, are not destroyed. Ever since the time of your ancestors you have turned away from my decrees and have not kept them.
